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



Kinsey Cove Groundbreaking Ceremony & 2021 AAHRA Awards

- Dothan Housing Authority

Dothan Housing (DH), Hollyhand Construction, the Banyan Foundation, AFHA, HUD, and others hosted a Hard Hat Celebration to mark the preservation and rehabilitation of Kinsey Cove (formerly Johnson Homes) on June 23, 2021. "Our top priority was to preserve affordable housing in Dothan," said Samuel P. Crawford, CEO of DH. "This is made possible through the collaboration and commitment of strategically aligned public-private partnerships."

The renovation of 212 affordable housing units at the Capstone at Kinsey Cove marks the fourth RAD PBV conversion for DH. The 34-million-dollar, 4% LIHTC project is one of the largest redevelopment efforts currently in progress in Alabama. "The Board is so proud

of the work that Sam and the DH staff have done to make this project a reality," said David C. Jamison, Chairman of the DH Board.

Revitalizing Trinity Walk

- Decatur Housing Authority

Decatur Housing Authority (DHA) was faced with an extreme shortage of affordable housing. In their Trinity Walk property, DHA replaced 112 obsolete housing units, added 43 new affordable homes in a high-cost area (9 at Trinity Walk and 34 at Oakview Walk), solved HUD contractual concerns, and returned residents with minimized relocation that kept students in local schools.

DHA engaged and partnered with residents, neighborhood, city, and city schools in creating a Transformation Plan that guided the successful revitalization of \$30.9 million in new housing.

DHA planned a three-phase development using low-income housing tax credits (LIHTC) and DHA direct financing. Plans included the development of two sites with 156 total units.

The final site included 34 units, at Oakview Walk, 7 of which are affordable market rate. These market rate units enabled DHA to develop affordable workforce housing for the "missing middle".

The units and community space were constructed to the EarthCraft Multifamily and EarthCraft Community energy standards. A children's playground, community gathering area, new plantings and

trees, and raised garden beds line the pleasant trails in the Greenspace created to protect the creek.

A central Greenway allows residents the ability to traverse the site without interacting with automobiles at most street crossings.



As a successful developer, DHA directly invested in its affordable housing, including \$1.26 million in TW I and \$1.35 million in Oakview Walk. DHA's development efforts are managed by its internal nonprofit, Preserving Affordable Housing, Inc.

Students in Trinity Walk I and II participate in the DHA Board Scholarships. College-bound high school seniors are eligible for initial scholarships of \$500 to \$3,000 and yearly thereafter for \$500 to \$1,000 per year. DHA has awarded over \$570,000 to high school seniors over the past 30 years.

Students at Oakview Walk participate in the Community Improvement Fund, a \$50.000 commitment to education

and health initiatives by DHA for early childhood education, college scholarships, enrichment programs, and tutoring.

DHA worked with numerous partners, including Gateway and Oakview Residents, City of Decatur, Hudson Housing Partners, Bank of America Merrill Lynch, Georgia Department of Community Affairs, US Department of Housing and Urban Development, Don Dressel Consulting, Hemenway Construction, Kimley-Horn and Associates Inc., McCurdy & Candler LLC, and Arnall Golden Gregory LLP to make this three phase revitalization project possible.

The Housing Authority of the City of Decatur, Georgia was recognized by SERC-NAHRO with an Award of Excellence and by NAHRO with a National Award for Merit for its efforts to revitalize the Trinity Walk Property. Trinity Walk will also be competing for a NAHRO Award of Excellence.




Sabrina Allen, Named ED



HUD Award: Resident Communication

The Housing Authority of the City of Biloxi received the "Director's Most Valuable Use of Technology Award of Excellence For Covid-19 Response" for their efforts to improve resident communication during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Over the last year and a half, it has been difficult to reach residents and quickly relay information across multiple properties. With the approaching severe weather season, Biloxi Housing knew it would be vital to quickly and reliably communicate with residents without having to go door-to-door.

Wanting to think "Outside the Box," they explored options that would allow them to distribute information with minimal staff time and involvement as well as a solution that would be compatible with existing Biloxi Housing Assets.

Biloxi Housing utilized CallMax, an MRI product, that allows for custom site based or agency-based messages for residents. CallMax integrates with their Housing Software to quickly distribute messages to residents.

customer service while not being able to physically visit with residents and limiting in office contact.

resided in publicly-assisted housing for a minimum of one, uninterrupted year.

Karuan Goldsberry, Maintenance Officer Saves Elderly, Disabled Woman from Apartment Fire

Durham Housing Authority maintenance officer, Karuan Goldsberry; sprang into action when he saw black smoke coming from a Liberty Street Apartment unit.

Karuan had just finished lunch on August 6th and was on the way to his next assignment when he heard fire alarms and a woman screaming for help. The elderly, disabled resident who lived inside the unit had not had time to call 911 for help before Goldsberry arrived.

"I immediately took action, got her out of there first, and then, went back in to make sure nobody was inside the unit," described Goldsberry. "I basically took her arm around my shoulder and kind of picked her up to get here out of the house. The fire started in the master bedroom, I just opened the door and nothing, but smoke came out. There

was a whole fireball. I just closed the door and got out of there." Goldsberry's N95 helped Goldsberry breathe while inside the apartment.

"I really don't consider myself a hero, I'm just doing my job as a employee and just as a human. When it's time to take action, I really don't think-I do" Goldsberry said.

Goldsberry joined DHA in July 2021, he shared that as a teenager he thought about becoming a volunteer firefighter, but for now he is happy with his current position.

Jobs Plus Program Grant

In April 2021, Rock Hill Housing Authority (RHHA) received the FY2020-2021 Jobs Plus grant for their Workman Street Property. RHHA is one of twelve agencies to receive the Jobs Plus Program for FY 2020-2021. RHHA is excited to bring this program to their residents and deploy the \$2,300,000 grant.

The Job Plus grant funding is to help Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) develop locally-based, job-driven approaches to increase earnings and advance employment outcomes for public housing residents. The place-based Jobs Plus program addresses poverty among public housing residents by incentivizing and enabling employment through earned income disregards for working residents and a set of services designed to support work, including employer linkages, job placement and counseling, educational advancement, and financial counseling.

Ideally, these incentives will saturate the target developments, building a culture of work and making working residents the norm.

The Jobs Plus Initiative program consists of the following three core components:

Employment-Related Service:

RHHA will offer employment-related services to residents with a range of employment needs. This includes services such as work-readiness training, employer linkages, financial counseling, educational advancement, job placement, and employment counseling.

Ideally, these incentives will saturate the target developments, building a culture of work and making working residents the norm.

Financial Incentives:

Targeted residents enrolled in Jobs Plus will be granted a 100 percent income disregard that will remain in place for up to 48 months.

Community Support for Work:

RHHA will market Jobs Plus services and financial incentives to all targeted residents in a development. The goal is to saturate communities with workrelated messages and to create a culture of work.

RHHA is actively pursuing partnerships with exciting and new community partners to assist in this new program.

Grants for Cherokee Place Development

"As construction costs continue to rise, it becomes a challenge to find funding to meet those rising costs. Grants from THDA help us to fill the gap."

From Housing Assistance to Home Ownership

All participants who choose to enroll in the Family Self-Sufficiency program (FSS) are invited to establish goals when they sign the 5-year contract. Many participants aim to take the many steps needed to prepare for home ownership. This involves working on their credit, budgeting, securing a higher paying job, and learning about the home buying process.

In July, FSS participant Amber closed on her home and moved out of Franklin Heights. Amber joined FSS when she moved into Franklin Heights in 2019 and successfully worked through the program to secure a higher paying job. Amber shares her reflection about moving from housing assistance to home ownership.

"I was on the waiting list for what seemed to be a very long time. When I finally got a call, I was so relieved due to being a single mother of two children and struggling with a stressful low wage job and life expenses. When I moved to the Franklin Heights neighborhood, I found the most amazing neighbors, to what now feels like family. I joined the FSS program after a couple weeks of being in my apartment and I was

beyond grateful for the wonderful people in the FSS community.

I loved the interaction, the encouragement, and being able to discuss my dreams. I got great advice and help with things I wanted out of life that I had no clue how to do myself or where to start. My FSS caseworker Everett made things so clear, easy and



understanding. He was so helpful in helping me get my goals, dreams written down and kept me motivated to try my best with check ins each month. I went to school for medical assistance. I got an amazing job in the Healthcare industry. My children have grown and learned from this experience as well, watching me keep going on my goals. We have graduated from the FSS Program and we just moved into our new home. We have

a new and bright outlook on life, and I give a great thanks to this community for their support." – Amber G.

As part of a larger City initiative to increase homeownership, Harrisonburg Redevelopment and Housing Authority (HRHA) operates a Homebuyer Assistance Program to support low to moderate income families and individuals purchase homes in the \$250,000 (Updated February 2021) and below market within the City of Harrisonburg. HRHA Connects families with community resources and helps walk them through the home buying process. Additionally, they assist in providing financial assistance by either down payment or closing cost assistances for eligible families.

Total awards anticipated being funded is \$50,000. Truist Bank is willing to hold funds not awarded, issuing a second RFP over the winter.

• Planning Grant:

After discussion, it was decided that the funds would be used to engage an IT Consultant to work with authorities with no experience in grant writing and/or launching a broadband initiative. Truist will work with a cohort of authorities over the next 12 months to help them develop plans of action, draft safety procedures and protocols and identify the most effective, cost-efficient internet models for their communities. Truist has indicated they will hold the remaining Broadband Initiative grant funds of \$50,000, awarding them to members of the cohort and in addition, will dedicate another \$100,000 in 2022 to assist the remaining cohort members launch their initiatives.



New Offices and Community Center Coming

- Wheeling Housing Authority

In July 2018, a fire destroyed the Sacred Heart Church building in North Wheeling. Owned by Wheeling Housing Authority, the building was home to its North Wheeling office. The former sanctuary had been converted into a community center and was widely utilized by the North Wheeling community, including the Faith Community Church. The lower part of the building was rented by Augusta Levy Learning Center.

"The final part of this journey is for WHA to rebuild," proclaimed Wolen. Shaffer Madama (Dennis Madama) is overseeing the construction, with Colaianni Construction providing contractor services.

The new building will house an office and maintenance shop for WHA and, once again, a community center for North Wheeling. Faith Community Church and

the Augusta Levy Learning Center have both moved into new permanent buildings.

Preventing a Grease Fire, **Are Your Residents Protected?**

Statistics reveal that nearly 5,000,000 cooking fires occur annually in the home. Of these fires, grease fires are the most dangerous and are responsible for 1 in every 5 home fire deaths. Learning how to prevent and put out grease fires could save a life.

Tips for Preventing Grease Fires within Your Units:

- Prevention is key, invest in an automatic fire dampening system like Auto-Out! If you have an Auto-Out installed and you accidentally start a grease fire, Auto-Out will work upon-flame activation. As the flames touch the wick at the bottom of the canister, the device will pop open and release fire-suppressant powder directly onto the fire.
- When reheating or doing any other kind of cooking, do not leave the kitchen until vou are done. Grease fires can start in less than 30 seconds so do not leave your food unattended.
- Don't throw in food carelessly when the oil is hot. It will splatter and can lead to burns. Drain all moisture from the food before dipping it into the hot oil. Also, avoid putting frozen foods into hot grease.

- Do not over-heat the grease beyond the maximum recommended temperature. If you notice any smoke or oil smells, it simply means that the oil is too hot and therefore you should turn the burner down.
- Keep children and pets distant from the stove when it is lit

The Do's and Dont's

Do Not Use Water On a Grease Fire No matter what you do, never think of stopping the flames with water. Why? Water contains oxygen and a lot of it. So when you pour water on the fire, instead of cooling down, you'll have powered it even more. Auto-Out smothers the flame when activated by releasing a powder substance. The powder that is released from the Auto-Out canister is not toxic or corrosive. If it is safe to do so, turn the burner off. This prevents a fire from re-igniting. Only turn the burner off if it is safe to do so. Proceed with safety and caution at all times.

Never Attempt to Move The Burning Pot/Pan Outside

Many people make this common mistake because it seems logical at the time. However, the burning oil could spill, and it can burn you and other flammable objects it comes into contact with.

Never Swat at the Fire with a Fabric Like a Towel or Apron

What happens if you do, you'll be fanning the flame, and it will spread even more. And the material could also catch fire.

Three out of five non-fatal fire injuries are caused when the victims tried to extinguish the fire themselves. Auto-Out is an auto activated device that safely extinguishes the fire. When your Auto-Out activates it will also emit a loud pop sound. This pop sound will alert you to its activation and should serve as a prompt to return to the stovetop

Auto-Out is a one-time use only device. If you are an apartment resident, contact your community manager immediately to notify them that your Auto-Out has activated. Depending on the scale and severity of the fire, there may be smoke damage or other items that require management attention. If you are in danger, call 911.
